I was recently discussing it with a club member, and we figured out that it is likely an old Sweet n Low Stik designed by Hal DeBolt. I was excited to learn what it was, so I promptly ordered a copy of the plans from the AMA plan service. At this point I have stripped the covering, identified the damage issues and started planning for the fixes and improvements I'd like to make. I also found an old photo online of an example of this kit that sported an added cabin that made it a bit more realistic looking. I think I'd like to imitate this customization if I can manage it.

I'd like to encourage all of you to find something interesting to build during this season, even if you don't consider yourself much of a builder. These days we have many options for kits and materials, so it doesn't have to be a traditional balsa & liteply craft. Speaking of which, I have chosen a kit from the stash of airplanes that were donated to the club to be our next raffle prize at the October meeting. It is an F-14 Tomcat kitted by 6mm Fly RC and includes all the foam, plywood and plastic parts to complete the airframe along with detailed instructions. To make the model more exciting, it even features the swept-wing mechanism that the F-14 is famous for. I am looking forward to one of you taking the kit home and maybe seeing it in action someday.
