FROM THE VEEP

I hope you all had a great Labor Day weekend and have had a chance to get out and fly recently! I enjoyed some "exciting" flying at our recent Electric Fly (by which I mean it was windy.) Still, it was great to gather with the members and friends who showed up and share some flight tales. I also will report that we've had a couple of good encounters with young students looking to get into the hobby, one from the scout troop that came to our training night and a mother and son who looked us up the next week. I feel this makes up for the slow training season, and we hope to see more students next year as the grapevine does its thing.

Despite there being oodles of resources out there, I'm going to attempt to share some tips and advice that I've learned during the time that I've been in the hobby. Now keep in mind that I have minimal experience with wet fueled power plants, so most of this will be for electric flight, but some of it is universal. For starters, don't forget to pack your transmitter when heading to the field. don't, the distance to the field will likely triple. When programming your ESC, always remove your propeller. You never know when the motor might start. And when you do install the propeller afterwards, the numbers should face forwards for best results. Batteries, (I can't say enough about battery safety here) make sure you understand your charger features and keep an eye on every charging battery. Whenever your battery is plugged into the ESC, keep your fingers out of the swing radius of the propeller, even if you have a throttle defeater, such as a throttle cut or a switch on the plane. Remember, electric motors produce the most torque at zero RPM's, and they will not stop until they've removed the obstacle from the path of the propeller (namely your finger.) You might now say "enough of the safety talk" to which I will say "okay!" Next, always check your throws before each flight. Your latest tinkering might have reversed a servo or, due to our "friend" entropy, a linkage may have broken. Better to check than pick up the pieces. If you have a path for air to enter an aircraft's fuselage, perhaps for cooling the ESC and battery, make sure there is a greater area for the air to exit at the other end, otherwise you won't get the amount of cooling you hoped for. For an electric powerplant, the battery's discharge rating should be greater than the ESC's amp rating, which should be bigger than what the motor can draw, not the other way around. Finally, you may be surprised at what is lurking above your garage. For instance, I just found a bundle of Fanfold foam that is just begging to be made into some airplanes!

If some of that is useful to some of you, then I've done a not-half-bad job. Since last month's club meeting was a rainout (though four brave board members held a brief meeting) the raffle prizes will be the same as I planned to give away then. To remind you all, the top prize is a Hangar 9, 12V PowerPro HD Starter. Hopefully I get to send it home with someone else this month.
